Valentine's Day crafts

Less is more with pom-poms

When it comes to handmade pom-poms, less is more. It may sound counterintuitive, but if you want pom-poms that are full and fluffy, don't be afraid to get out your scissors and snip.

Materials:

yarn, wool roving or T-shirt fabric cardboard scissors embroidery thread and needle ribbon

Instructions:

1. Make two doughnutshaped cardboard templates. They can be any size. Cut a chunk out of each template, a few inches long, so the templates resemble horseshoes or rings with pieces cut out of them.

2. Cut a piece of embroidery

thread about 8 inches long and lay it over one of the templates. Place the other template on top, sandwiching the thread, with the ends of the thread hanging out the cut edges.

3. If using T-shirt fabric, cut it into ½-inch strips. If using wool roving, gently pull it apart into ½-inch strips. Starting at one end, wrap the fabric, roving or yarn around the template until you get to the other end. If the fabric or roving runs out, just add another strip, covering up the end of the previous strip. 4. Repeat until you have at least three layers of fiber wrapped around the templates. The more layers you add, the fuller the pom-pom will be.

5. Loosely tie the embroidery thread ends that are hanging from the template together. Holding the templates together with one hand, use sharp scissors to cut through

the yarn, fabric or roving along the outside diameter of the template, wedging the tips of the scissors in between the two cardboard pieces.

6. Pull the embroidery thread tight and tie a knot. Remove the templates.

7. Cut two circular templates from cardboard, slightly smaller than the original templates. Sandwich the pom-pom between the two cardboard circles and use the edge of the cardboard as a guide to trim the pom-pom. 8. Make two more pom-poms and use the needle and embroidery thread to sew them together in a triangle shape with two pom-poms side by side and the third centered below that pair. Pass the needle through the center of the pom-poms several times. 9. Continue trimming until you have a heart shape. 10. Add a loop of ribbon for
